About our Honoree

Matilde Behar was 14 years old when she first set eyes on the handsome Rafael Galicot. Already aged 34, he was calm, mature and worldly. Rafael had fled Istanbul years earlier to avoid the military, finding employment all over Europe (including work as a casino croupier in Monaco), and mastering multiple languages. Now, in 1936, Rafael was a travel agent in México City whose explorations brought him to the sleepy Southern Chihuahua silvermining town of Santa Barbara. There, Matilde's parents Isidor and Sofia, also Sephardic Jews from Turkey, operated a small general store grandly named El Nuevo Mundo.

The younger of two children, Matilde was dark and womanly – and bright, having already found a job as a teacher at the local elementary school. Matilde, who always knew her mind, immediately sized up Rafael Galicot as excellent husband material. Evaluating the paucity of suitable matches for Matilde within the tiny Jewish community in Santa Barbara, Isidor and Sofia agreed, and discussions and proposals ensued.



Jose Galicot



Matilde and Rafael were married in 1936, and Rafael thereupon settled in Santa Barbara so that his young bride could remain near her parents. On October 1, 1937, at age 15, Matilde delivered the first of their two children, a son they named José (Hebrew name Joseph). Their second son Julio (Yehuda) was born in 1940. Through the early years of their marriage, Rafael was Matilde's household mentor, instructing her in cooking, housekeeping and child care.

In 1940, Rafael and Matilde moved their small family from Santa Barbara to México City, where Rafael pursued a business venture that was so unsuccessful that, in 1943, they found it necessary to relocate again. This time they settled in Tijuana, closer to Isidor's brother in Los Angeles. Rafael established a wholesaling business that sold suit materials, including fabrics, buttons, zippers, padding and silks for linings, to the many men's clothing manufacturers and tailors in that city. Rafael's business prospered: He bought an office building and a warehouse, and began to invest in apartments.

José and Julio attended the local Tijuana public schools, where discipline was strict and caning was common. When José completed 6th grade, Rafael and Matilde decided that he should have a more intensive Jewish education. So, in the fall of 1949, they drove José to México City and enrolled him in the Colegio Hebreo Sefaradi. José remained in that school through 9th grade, rooming with relatives nearby.

The Colegio Hebreo Sefaradi changed José's life. A shy, tentative, bespectacled and heavy-set fellow when he arrived, José transformed himself. He flourished in the school's egalitarian atmosphere, where teachers dispensed discipline

through patient suggestion. What is more, José noticed that the student leaders in the school were physically strong fellows who stood up for one another. Aspiring to a position among the elite, José lost weight and worked hard on physical conditioning. He got into fights and won. He was an exceptional volleyball player, and organized his own league.



By the time he left the Colegio Hebreo Sefaradi José had begun to plumb the deep reservoir of personal fortitude that has been his mainstay. At public high school in México City, José was a champion of the underdog, once rescuing a fellow student from a gang of rowdies who were shooting off Bastille Day firecrackers inside the school building. That student's name was Carlos Slim.



During high school, José and a friend, Arieh Konig, founded a politically middle-of-the road Sephardic Zionist club, Tifereth Zion. Not as left-wing as the Hashomer Hatzair, but slightly left of religious groups such as B'nei Akiva, Tifereth Zion had 120 young members, both men and women.

Following high school, José enrolled in the Universidad Nacional Autónoma de México (UNAM), México City, to study civil engineering, all the while pursuing his deep passion for Zionism and Jewish community organization.

Matilde's parents, Isidor and Sofia Behar, did not remain in little Santa Barbara, and eventually they also moved to Tijuana. Isidor set up another El Nuevo Mundo there. Rafael and Matilde had purchased a small house in Tijuana that became a meeting place for the many Mexican Jewish families – both Ashkenazi and Sephardi – who were migrating to Northern Baja California during the 1950s and 60s to seek jobs or start businesses in the thriving U.S. border region. These gatherings cemented friendships that led to the founding of the Magen David Jewish Center, which in 1965 became the Centro Social Israelita, an organization that, to this day, fosters Jewish identity and provides recreation and Jewish community services.

José and Ana

Ana Raquel (Hebrew name Hannah) Levine (called "Janche") was born in México City in July 1939. Both of her parents, Chaya and Hayim, came from Ashkenazic Jewish families in Lithuania. Her father had immigrated to México in the 1920s at the age of 12, and her mother, in 1936. Ana was the oldest of three children, all of whom spoke Yiddish as their first language.

As a student during the 1940s and 50s at the Colegio Hebreo Tarbut, the secular Zionist school for Ashkenazi families in México City, Ana developed a deep devotion to Israel. At the age of 12, Ana joined the liberal Zionist youth group Hanoar Hatzioni, and from the ages of 13 to 20, she served on its Board of Directors. In 1952, Ana met Golda Meir, who had come to México through the Jewish Agency to promote support for Israel. Recognizing Ana's aptitude for



leadership, she warned her "Don't let your special gift die out... Promise me you will come to live in Israel."

Ana's Hanoar Hatzioni group, which was small, always was seeking new members. Why not recruit the members of Tifereth Zion, which was well-known for its fine and handsome young men? Ana felt that such passionate and aggressive fellows might respond to an offer of a joint sporting program, so she contacted a local public high school, which agreed to permit Hanoar Hatzioni to use its athletic fields. In describing how she persuaded the Sephardic Zionist group to agree to joint programming, and ultimately a merger in 1954, with Hanoar Hatzioni, Ana points out that "Our group included many beautiful young girls. Smart ones, who now are writers and artists and have done a lot with their lives. I sent them to conquer the fellows." One of those lovely young women was Ana herself, who became acquainted with José at the first joint event of the two groups. She was 15 years old.

Thereafter, Ana and José saw one another often at Zionist youth meetings, and they worked together as Jewish summer camp organizers and mentors, responsible, as a couple, for as many as 150 sleep-away campers at one time. Ana always was the camp's mother figure, tucking each child tightly into his or her cot each night so that the sleeping area became known as Tamales Janche, or "Janche's Pockets." From these beginnings, Ana and José became increasingly active as Zionist organizers, José being elected head of the Amalgamated Federation of Jewish Youth Groups in México in 1956.

Soon Ana and José declared their life's intentions to their parents: They were havorim, intending to settle in Israel as soon as possible. They were in love and wanted to marry. However, events intervened that put their relationship on hold. As a leader, or madricha, within Hanoar Hatzioni, Ana was selected in 1957 for a one-year Machon L'Madrichei Chutz La'Aretz (Institute for Youth Leaders in the Diaspora) scholarship to study in Jerusalem, sponsored by the World Zionist Organization. Ana received a diploma qualifying her to teach Hebrew. Upon her return to México, she attended the UNAM, where she continued university courses toward becoming a teacher.

Meanwhile, José had risen to high leadership in Hanoar Hatzioni, promoting Zionist causes and seeking enrollments, in addition to attending to his studies. In 1958, José received his own invitation to Israel, as a delegate to the First Jewish

Congress for Youth. He is proud to recall that the speech he delivered at the opening ceremony, as the Zionist Youth representative from Latin America, was sufficiently inspirational that both David Ben Gurion and Golda Meir approached and hugged him enthusiastically at its conclusion. José traveled in Israel for six months, taking in the sights around the 10-year-old country.

When José's Israel travels were over, he accepted an appointment as shaliach for Jewish youth (ages 14 to 17) in the community of San Jose, Costa Rica. When he arrived, he found a dilapidated meeting house next to a synagogue and precisely two teenagers enrolled in the youth program. Taking a cue from Tom Sawyer, José started painting the building himself. When curious young people came by to ask who he was and what he was doing, he put them to work. Applying that clever tactic, and many others, during one year in Costa Rica, followed by a similar assignment in Guatemala, José was able to expand youth programming in those countries to encompass more than 600 participants.

When José moved back to México City from Central America, he re-ignited his relationship with Ana. Not only was the couple planning to marry, now they both were formidable youth Zionist organizers. As key activists and leaders

within Hanoar Hatzioni, they made that organization strong, putting on several Jewish Youth Conferences, including a series of symposia on Jewish living in Cuernavaca, México, with speakers that included the German Jewish psychologist and social philosopher Erich Fromm. Ana recalls: "We had seminars on topics such as psychology, sexology, Jewish education and ethics... In order to be a mensch you need to know many things!"

José and Ana finally were married, in a civil ceremony in Tijuana on February 19, 1961, and in a Jewish ceremony in México City on March 19, 1961. She was 21 and he was 23. "This was a time in México when Sephardi and Ashkenazi didn't mix," comments Ana, "but we did what we wanted and it turned out fine."

José and Ana both viewed their marriage as the first step on a journey toward life on a kibbutz in Israel. Immediately, they applied to the Jewish Agency to arrange the paperwork to enable them to make aliyah, and to send them airline tickets. While waiting for the arrangements to be completed, Ana and José stayed in Tijuana at an apartment owned by José's parents, and José went to work in his father's business. Almost immediately, their plans were disturbed: Rafael suffered the first of several heart attacks, and Ana became pregnant. Matilde, who also was looking after her aging parents, needed assistance in tending to Rafael.

By the time their tickets from the Jewish Agency arrived, José and Ana had their first baby, Denisse Matilde, born in 1962, and José had launched a business in Tijuana. He also had enrolled at the Tijuana campus of the UNAM, where he pursued, and ultimately completed, a Licentiate in Economics. Ana was accepted as a student at the Escuela de Trabajo Social de Baja California, where she studied social work.



Ana and José did not make aliyah to Israel as planned. Instead, they built their family where they were. The birth of Denisse Matilde was followed by those of Chaya Aida, Rafael Solomon and Gregorio David.

Business after business after business

Over the past 50+ years, José Galicot has remained one of Tijuana's most resourceful businessmen. Despite devaluations of the peso at times when he was heavily invested in retail, and competition from cell phones and iPhones when he was in the landline telephone services business, José has been undaunted in identifying and pursuing promising ventures of all sorts.



Building upon knowledge gained during his short tenure at Rafael's suit materials company, José established a highly-successful men's jacket manufacturing company, Galber S.A., in 1962. In 1968, José and his brother Julio purchased two beauty supply wholesaling companies, La Favorita and El Ahorro, and transformed them into a retail chain with multiple shops throughout Baja California.

José always had been enamored with "beautiful but lonely" Cabo San Lucas, and early on he began to buy land there. In the late 1960s and throughout the 70s, José invested in commercial space: in shopping centers, in Tijuana (Viva Tijuana Plaza) and Cabo San Lucas (Gali Plaza) and resorts in Cabo San Lucas (Plaza Nautica and Plaza del Sol) and elsewhere in Baja California, such as Rosarito Beach (Calafia Paradise Resort). From 1984 to 1993, José operated the famous "OH!" Disco in downtown Tijuana, modeled on New York's Studio 54. OH! was the hottest club in town, attracting mainly Americans, including celebrities Madonna, Robin Williams, Clint Eastwood, Tina Turner and Neil Diamond. It also was popular with Mexican clients who might have been more infamous. "Everyone went there," José once told the Los Angeles Times, "the good and the bad."

Over the years, José has held senior executive positions with Mexican banks in Tijuana and México City, including Multibanco Mercantile de México, and he continues, to date, as an independent consultant to banks throughout Baja California. José got into the telecommunications business in a major way in the 1980s at the behest of his sons, investing in several communications companies, most notably BBG Communications, at one time the world's largest provider of collect-calling services.

Had he not been so extraordinarily successful in business, or so devoted to bettering society, we well might be honoring José for his achievements as a writer. José is an accomplished journalist and poet, having published 10 books of commentary and poetry. Congregants who regularly attend High Holiday services at Ohr Shalom recall José's poetic readings each year at Kol Nidre. His poems, delivered in beautiful Spanish and translated to English by his grandson Ilan Podlipsky, always are a highlight of the evening. The readers of *Zeta*, the major weekly Baja California newspaper, know José primarily as a journalist, owing to the column, "Facetas," which he wrote regularly for more than 20 years. The *Zeta* pieces have been collected into the books *Presencias de la Ciudad*, *Setenta* and *Facetas*.

José, Ana and Tikun Olam

While José and Ana still were living with small children in a Tijuana apartment owned by his parents, they already were deeply engaged as local Jewish community activists. Although she also was completing university degrees, first in social work at the Escuela de Trabajo Social (where she taught group dynamics courses), and then in education at the Universidad Autónoma de Baja California, Ana began to organize educational and social activities for Jewish children in their neighborhood.



As more children joined, she set up a program of classes on Sundays, Tuesdays and Thursdays and recruited talented young mentors from the community. Modeling her program on the multi-faceted youth Zionist programs she and José had led in México for Hanoar Hatzioni, she called it Ken, or "nest."

As the Ken grew, José and some of his colleagues persuaded wealthy local Jewish businessmen to purchase a building, and to install a pool and sports facilities. Opened in 1967, the physical premises of the Centro Social Israelita, which became the home of the Ken, was a collaborative effort of both Sephardic and Ashkenazic Jews. For more than 10 years, Ana served as principal of the Ken Jewish school, and she and José established summer camps for the Centro Social Israelita.

Since 1975, Ana has been a devoted member of WIZO, the Women's International Zionist Organization, a volunteer association that funds social welfare projects in Israel and elsewhere. Locally, Ana's name practically is synonymous with WIZO, reflecting the fact that she served as President of San Diego-Tijuana WIZO from 1990 to 2015. Ana continues her WIZO activities to date, developing cultural and educational programs such as Ulpan classes for older women and men.

José has devoted his extra-business interests to scores of involvements, particularly in México and Israel. Only a brief review of those is possible here:

México

José loves the city of Tijuana. Early on, he pursued projects to promote the economic development of the city and its environs and enhance educational and cultural opportunities there. Among the organizations to which José generously has devoted his time, often serving as a Board member, have been the San Diego-Tijuana Smart Border Coalition, El Trompo Interactive Museum, and the Sala Anguiano.

José is Tijuana's biggest booster. He readily points out two things: (1) Tijuana gets a bad rap. Whereas the media focus on drug cartels and crime, Tijuana – México's 4th most populous city – actually is a manufacturing powerhouse, and (2) The San Diego-Tijuana metropolitan area, with its high-tech capabilities and educated workforce, seriously could become one of the world's most dynamic economic regions. José once commented to *La Prensa*, the San Diego-based Latin

American newspaper that "San Diego has long believed it has been living with a toad called Tijuana, but in reality Tijuana is a prince waiting to be discovered."

José will tell you that 600 manufacturing companies operate in Tijuana, including 34 aerospace firms and 60 medical products developers, and that every one of the high-tech heart valves used in surgeries in the U.S. has been made in Tijuana.

In 2010, to spread the word more widely and loudly, and thereby to attract additional investment in Tijuana, José and other Mexican business leaders organized the first Tijuana Innovadora (TI) conference, a forum



addressing the multiple advantages of doing business in Tijuana, held over a 2-week period in October. José and his fellow organizers lined up as speakers Al Gore, Larry King, Wikipedia co-founder Jimmy Wales, Twitter co-founder Biz Stone, Nobel Prize-winning economist Robert Aumann, Paul Jacobs from Qualcomm, and others. The forum showcased, to more than 750,000 attendees (including Carlos Slim and Mexican President Calderón), the achievements of Tijuana-based companies in the sciences and engineering, as well the city's artistic, cultural and culinary assets.

Since the first TI conference, Tijuana Innovadora has evolved into a multi-faceted social action organization, with José as its President. TI has mounted two even larger bi-annual business conferences, bringing in crowds numbering 900,000 in 2012 and 1.1 million in 2014. Now TI has launched a set of "Spheres of Influence" projects aimed at improving quality-of-life for all of Tijuana, tapping and directing the youthful energy of the hundreds of young people who have volunteered to staff the TI events. To date, these projects have offered to young people guidance, leadership training, and hands-on experience in such areas as fashion design and merchandising, entrepreneurship, computer applications development, fine arts curating, and musical performance. TI now has a permanent central office staff that handles administrative, legal, public relations and marketing functions year-round.

José has been honored many times by the grateful citizens of Tijuana, receiving, for example, the Tijuana Medal for Civic Merit in 1995 and 2010, and the 2010 Tijuana Citizen of the Year Award.

Israel

Since the early years when Ana and José lived in Israel as Zionist youth leaders, they have returned dozens of times. Of course, through WIZO, Ana has been an angel to Israel. Ana and José also have been active in pro-Israel ventures that include the Maccabee Games and the Israel Navy Veterans Association.

Among the Galicots' current involvements is the Tel Aviv-Yafo Foundation, the international fund-raising arm of the City of Tel Aviv-Yafo. The objective of the Foundation is to enhance the quality of daily life in the metropolitan area by

financing projects (with funds matched 50-50 by the City) focused on education, social welfare and the environment. In September 2011, the Tel Aviv-Yafo School District opened the "Jose and Ana Galicot Family Kindergartens," which actually are pre-kindergartens for 3 and 4-year-olds, in three neighborhoods. In 2014 and 2015, the School District dedicated additional educational facilities donated by the Galicots: a library and resource center at Yud Alef High School, which serves students with learning disabilities, and a science center and library at Hamagan Elementary School, in the Maoz Aviv neighborhood, where many refugees from Darfur have settled.

Of course, José and Ana Galicot donate significantly to agencies in and around San Diego. Concerned that their children and their 17 grandchildren in the U.S. should live their lives within a community-focused Jewish environment such as the one José and Ana helped to create in Tijuana, they have supported the Ken Jewish Center in Chula Vista. The Galicots also have been major supporters of the San Diego Museum of Art in Balboa Park, where José is a member of the Board of Trustees.
